Dear friends.

BUILDING EXTERIOR Plans call for replacing the exterior curtain wall siding with block and brick to give the school a pleasing, modern look and increase energy efficiency. The roof is also in need of repair or replacement.

HVAC Boilers that currently heat the building are original equipment, so plans call for a new mechanical system for heating and air conditioning.

INFRASTRUCTURE Plans call for upgrading interior electrical service and lighting, modernizing restrooms, adding fire sprinklers, and removing hazardous materials as necessary.

CLASSROOMS Plans call for numerous improvements to the classrooms and performing arts areas by upgrading science labs, improving sound isolation between choir and band areas, painting and modernizing the classrooms, and adding glass to interior and exterior walls to improve natural lighting.

ACCESS Plans call for a three-story central staircase to improve access to all levels on the east and west wings of the school.

Education in the arts is an integral part of the development of each Holy Family Catholic Schools student. From improving vocabulary and test scores to increasing learning experiences in communication and leadership, arts education plays a vital role in preparing students for success in career and personal life. Performers in the programs are unique, talented and hard working. A significant number of Holy Family students pursue fine arts programs in college, both extracurricular and academically, because of the preparation and enjoyment Holy Family programs offer.

#### **Wahlert Catholic High School**

#### Curricular Opportunities

Wahlert Catholic offers concert choir, concert band, jazz band, guitar ensemble and many art opportunities as part of its fine arts curriculum. Wahlert Catholic students interested in curricular choir can choose from 9th & 10th Men's Chorus, 9th & 10th Women's Chorus, Concert Choir and A Capella choir. #### Co-Curricular Opportunities **Show Choir**

Show choir is a co-curricular activity open to seventh and eighth grade students who are currently enrolled in choir or concert band. Ignite! is a singing and dancing ensemble incorporating choreography and drama elements into performances. Music includes songs from a variety of styles such as pop, jazz and musical theater.

#### Jazz Band (MazzJazz)

lazz band is a co-curricular activity open to all students currently enrolled in concert band. Mazzlazz is comprised of approximately 35 sixth through eighth graders who focus on various styles of jazz, improvising and learning different scales fifth grade students. #### **Theater**

An all-school musical is produced each spring that draws participation from 80-90 students. Students audition, rehearse and perform the fully-staged musical. ## **Co-Curricular Opportunities**

In addition to traditional music classes, choir and bell choir programs are offered. All Holy Family elementary schools participate in a regional honor choir for festival, in which students work with a guest conductor in the afternoon and perform in the evening, is attended each fall on the Loras College campus.

#### **Band**

Individual band lessons are offered to fifth graders at each elementary school. Students from all schools meet on Monday nights to practice as one fifth grade band, performing in two concerts a year. The lessons and concerts are used to prepare the students for Mazzuchelli band opportunities.

Third through fifth grade students have the opportunity to join art club. It is an afterschool program that encourages students to use new techniques and materials to create art. Students use recycled materials to make stamps, deepen the study of the color wheel and create 2D and 3D sculptures.

#### **Theater**



# Alumni Spotlight Fr. John Schlegel ('62)





for today's parents: "In a world where parents are economically sensitive, a Catholic education is one of the best investments families can make." Father Schlegel is a firm believer in Catholic schools—especially high school. "Faith formation takes place at the high school level. In college, things are already in place, and it may be too late to find one's faith." he said.

John Schlegel, S.J., Wahlert graduate (1962), has words of advice and his five siblings experienced a faith-filled Catholic upbringing in which religion and an understanding of the workings of the Holy Spirit were constants. Faculty members will remember him for much more: for his incredible depth of intellect and his ability to identify with faculty."

Father Schlegel left education in 2011 to serve as president and publisher of America Magazine, a Jesuit ministry. Since June 2014, he has been pastor of the Church of the Gesu in Milwaukee and chaplain at Marquette University. He was recently diagnosed with cancer and has been told he has four to six months to live.


This diagnosis has provided Father Schlegel with reason to reflect on his life and his legacy. He appreciates the values of faith, love of education and strong work ethic instilled in him and his brothers and sisters by their parents. Those values inspired five of the six Schlegel children to work in education.

He fondly recalls his education at Wahlert High School, including "solid" religion classes, community service and extracurricular activities and credits the school for igniting his sense of social justice. At Wahlert, he was president of the speech team and acted in and directed plays. He remembers being with students, religious sisters and priests who were not afraid of being Catholic and who were joyful in their faith.

Father Schlegel also remembers the Dubuque priests who encouraged his vocation. He credits Msgr. Dorance Foley, pastor of St. Patrick's Parish and president of Loras College; Father Jim Chapman, religion teacher and moderator of Wahlert's yearbook, The Harvest; and Father Joseph Herard, Dubuque's diocesan


