Dear friends,

Even if I weren't looking at a calendar, I would know it's Spring because of the frenetic pace I see in all Holy Family schools. Every day from now until the end of the year is jam-packed with concerts, sports contests, activities, and the cherished events leading up to graduation. In the blink of an eye, this year will be history, and we will reflect on it with satisfaction for all we have accomplished.

The renovation of Wahlert gives us tangible evidence of our progress. The west wing, bridge, kitchen and cafeteria are the remaining large-scale items to be completed by the targeted end date, November 1. As I walk the halls each day and see students who are thrilled with their new environs, I am filled with gratitude for all of you who made this possible.

We continue to see progress toward our faith and academic goals as well. Prayer, Masses, Reconciliation, retreats and service opportunities continue to provide the foundation for all that we do. Teams of teachers and administrators at every level meet regularly to debate how we best meet all learners' needs; the fruits of their labors are seen in the learning opportunities that challenge students to solve real-world problems.

While faith and academics are our focus, we can't take our eyes off enrollment, which is the key indicator of our system's financial health. We are pleased that this year's enrollment beat projections, but people still are amazed to learn Wahlert Catholic's total student body currently equals some of the larger individual classes from the 60s and 70s. The change in the average family size, though, is a huge factor in the enrollment decline for Catholic schools across the country. This issue features the Reisen family that sent 14 children through Wahlert. We think that's the largest number of alumni from one family, though we would be interested in knowing if any family can top that total.

All parents who choose Catholic education, whether you have one or up to 14 children, will be able to relate to the Reisens' prioritizing and sacrifice. To all of you, we say thank you.

The Reisens: CELEBRATING A 14-FOLD COMMITMENT TO CATHOLIC EDUCATION

Combing through his father's old papers, Dan Reisen '81 came across a treasured news release from Wahlert Catholic High School, dated June 13, 1988. It read, 'Wahlert High School's tradition of family support reached new heights this June when Ted Reisen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Reisen of East Dubuque, became the fourteenth member of the Reisen family to graduate from Wahlert.''

If you ask one of the Reisen siblings about their family's priority for choosing Catholic education, you might hear them say, "We didn't know there was another way!" As it turns out, they wouldn't have had it any other way.

Honoring the memory of their parents, Ralph and Jean, the Reisen family gladly shared their story. They highlighted kind and hardworking individuals who were as devoted to their Catholic faith as they were to the large family that they raised.

Now, in adulthood, with families of their own, the Reisen kids truly appreciate the sacrifice and commitment it took for their parents to send them all through Catholic schools. "At the time," youngest daughter Tammy Barry '87 recalls, "our parents never made us feel like our education was a burden, but now that I look back, I understand the financial dynamics and I am in awe that we never felt their stress. Rather, they focused on our doing well in school."

Expressing gratitude for having received the gift of a Catholic education, Tammy said she is not quite sure what life would have been like without it. She described a sense of community they have gained being connected by faith. "Church is where we tend to gather

as a group -- weddings, funerals and special occasions," she pointed out.

A shared set of core values has formed these individuals as the people they are today."Wahlert Catholic supported what dad and mom taught us at home," said Diane Trannel '72. "We learned what it meant to be good people, to earn respect, and to treat each other with love," added Patty Freese '75.

Their faith-based education has left this family feeling as though they can get through anything with God at their side.They appreciate having acquired strong



work ethics, the discipline and equality derived from school uniforms, being greeted with a smile and the many opportunities to express and build upon their faith.

Tammy felt her school's small student/teacher ratio taught her how to better form relationships in her adult life, and that including prayer and worship in school meant they always had somewhere to share their thoughts. In all, the Reisens agreed that their gift of Catholic schooling meant that their parents wanted the best education possible for them and they wouldn't put a price tag on that.

Family Matriarch Jean Reisen was diagnosed with late-stage pancreatic cancer the day after Thanksgiving 2016. She passed away surrounded by her family on January 5. Growing up, Jean expected the children to contribute to the household chores. When money was tight, she would offer child care and cleaning services outside of the home – skills she had mastered running a tight ship for a family of 16.

Ralph preceded Jean in death by 17 years. His children described him as a hard-working and caring man who poured concrete during the day prior to his second-shift job at the Dubuque Packing Company.

The daily sacrifice was not only financial. Living on the other side of the river, the Reisens had transportation to contend with. Before the oldest boys could drive their siblings, the kids would navigate city bus connections, rely on carpools, or ride with Ralph as he chauffeured them to school and jobs they held in Dubuque. Donna Fluhr '71, Diane and Lynn Noonan '74 remember working 30-plus hours a week at various milk houses and nursing homes to do their part.



Looking back, Mary Berning '79 is ever-grateful for her parents' deep faith. "As I discerned my vocation and my career path, I knew my Catholic faith would be a driving force." She became a Catholic grade school teacher and values the importance of classroom time as an extension of faith learning in the home. "In those seven hours," she said, "so much love and kindness is shared."

For each of them, fond memories surround school activities such as state athletic tournaments, the Teens Encounter Christ (TEC) retreat for seniors, Homecoming, serving on student council and the many great relationships they developed over the years – numerous wonderful experiences students at Wahlert Catholic enjoy to this day.

When 14 siblings make their way through a school, faculty and staff are sure to form special bonds. Reminiscing about the teachers who profoundly influenced their lives – and in some cases, their kids' lives, too – several common names came to mind. Among them were Jim Killoran, Bernie O'Connor, Dick Osterberger and current Wahlert Catholic Assistant Principal and Women's Cross Country Coach, Cynthia Wagner.

Of course, for some, Wahlert Catholic gave them more than great memories and a deeper connection to their faith. Mary met her husband Roger Berning '79 at Wahlert. 'It was the Sadie Hawkins dance that set my life with Roger in motion. I asked him our sophomore year.' Together, Mary and Roger have raised six children of their own and modeled their parents in providing a Catholic education for their children at Holy Family. Donna and Diane also married their high school sweethearts, Ron Fluhr '68 and Jerry Trannel '70.

The Tradition of Catholic Education Runs Deep

Ralph and Jean Reisen were both products of St. Mary's Catholic School in East Dubuque. By their example, the next Reisen generation has continued to prioritize educating their families in the faith. Twenty grandchildren have attended Holy Family Catholic Schools and Catholic schools where they now live. Those in the family who pursued post-secondary degrees have also done so through Catholic colleges.

RENO report

The work continues at Wahlert Catholic with ground-level, hallway ceiling demolition as well as plumbing, electrical and structural changes in the gym and locker rooms. Every opportunity to maximize time and efficiency has been captured in preparation for large-scale reconstruction taking place this summer. While students were Spring Breaking, the cafeteria asbestos flooring was removed. Temporary walls have been created to facilitate curtain wall removal in the weight room and cafeteria. Roof replacement in the gym and painting in the O'Connor Activity Center (OAC) is underway. The west wing, bridge, kitchen and cafeteria remain to be completed by the target project end date of November 1, 2017.
