CULTURE

Question 1: What are two things you would like us to keep in mind as we determine how to meet our students' behavioral needs? (42)

- Communication with parents
- Communicating expectations/consequences with students
- Soliciting input from students (expectations/consequences)
- Continued support for parents
 - Are there new/updated trainings/techniques?
- Connecting with outside resources
- Address boys' developmental needs more effectively, add more recess especially unstructured outdoors (not what's happening in Finland)

 - We need to be more intentionally hospitable/welcoming to new students and families both

Question 1: How can we encourage families to attend Mass on a weekly basis and to more fully engage in their parish and church communities? (21)

- Identify number of families at each parish in Holy Family. Identify those families who attend and do not attend Mass. Go door to door to invite families to attend Mass.
- Have kids be involved at parish Mass at a young age
- Realize the importance of Mass (10 commandments)
- Sunday Mass higher priority than sports, etc.
- Middle school and high school are so important for faith formation
 - Parents please don't give up on church attendance after sacramental milestones
- Discussion groups for kids and/or parents about faith issues
 - Nationally known speakers, too.

 - Just hang out with Holy Family families (adults)
- Mass attendance
- Weekly discussion at school regarding Mass on Sunday
- Kid choirs sing at Mass
- Adult faith formation opportunities for parents
 - Build parents faith lives up
- Intentional collaboration between Holy Family and individual parishes
- Have a community Mass once per month at Wahlert
- Have weekly Mass at Mazzuchelli and Wahlert
- Have athletic teams or academic teams rotate to different parishes for Sunday Mass

Question 2: What makes you feel connected to Holy Family and what opportunities for improved connections exist? (24)

- Keep Holy Family news inserts in church bulletins
